5th Sunday Giving

Through our Fifth Sunday Giving program, which takes place in months when there are five Sundays, SNUUC members and friends are invited to make contributions to organizations whose missions align with Unitarian Universalist values. On so-called Fifth Sundays, plate offerings not marked as pledge are given to the designated nonprofit.

In January, SNUUC welcomed former youth member Katie Beach to speak on behalf of the Mary Brennan INN's Center for Transformative Change, where she works as a case manager. The Mary Brennan INN is committed to serving the hungry and homeless on Long Island, and its Center for Transformative Change, launched in 2016, aims to provides social services to its guests to help them get on their feet. SNUUC raised \$270 on January 26 for the Center for Transformative Change.

On March 29, SNUUC will welcome Mary Beth Guyther to speak on behalf of the Long Island Area Council of UU Congregations' Social Justice Roundtable. In September, LIAC engaged Mary Beth's services as Social Justice Coordinator to reinvigorate the roundtable and increase UU voices on Long Island by bringing people together from our 11 congregations. This past fall, Mary Beth obtained a \$2,000 grant for the roundtable from the UU Funding Panel; there is an additional \$4,000 available if LIAC can raise matching funds. We are aiming to raise additional funds through SNUUC's Fifth Sunday Giving to help the Social Justice Roundtable fulfill its mission to provide a space to: bring congregations together to communicate and collaborate, link with nonprofits fighting for social justice, strategize with other progressive faith allies, and develop tools for bearing witness to strengthen the voice of UUism to promote social justice on Long Island.

Please come for worship on March 29 ready to hear the good news of the roundtable's work — and to give generously.

In the RE Wing

This is my first column since accepting the role of Religious Education Team Leader at SNUUC. I have been working with Harriet in RE doing Youth Ministries for the past 4 years and I attended the RE program here.

I'm pleased to report that all is well in the Brantley Wing under our newly configured program for children and youth. After RE Coordinator Harriet Arnold took a medical leave in January, the RE team met with the Rev. Linda to re-envision the program. We came up with a plan to have a small rotating group of teachers pitch in each week.

We are grateful for the members of the congregation taking on roles as teachers. I am so grateful for Sharon Kennelty-Cohen who has volunteered to be with us almost every Sunday. She has been joined by Sharon Pataky and Jim and Diane Hawkins. Their commitment to SNUUC and to our children and youth has helped us move seamlessly into the Spring.

Two of our youth are participating in the Coming of Age program this year. This is the Unitarian Universalist rite of passage that facilitates an in depth learning about the history of our faith and developing and defining beliefs. It is the culmination of a process that involves the young person meeting with a mentor, studying the history of our faith and designing projects that reflect their learning and aspirations. The youth will grapple with questions about God, Spirit of Life, Jesus, miracles, life after death, fate and destination.

This yearlong project will be celebrated at the Coming of Age service at SNUUC on June 7 where the youth will share their credo statements, which are their belief statements of what they hold to be true.


